### **President Martin & The Directors'** Information Spot.....

President Martin reminded Fellows of the Interest Meeting to be held Friday November 25th, 9.45 am at Rotary House, to establish a new Probus Club. Martin's phone has been running hot, and it looks as if the club will be well subscribed. Members could encourage anyone interested to attend on Friday. Several letters of thanks were read, from World President Karl Wilhelm Stenhammer (appreciation of Framjee Essays sent by Past President Olga Barrett), from the Luck Centre in appreciation of our donation of a computer, from the Karori Rotary Club looking for Christmas Pudding purchasers, from Manawatu Foster Care Association saying that our \$250 donation was most appreciatively used on a social outing to the Lido, Stu Schwartz advised the calendars should be here next Monday, some extras are available. President Martin gave notice that the District, as did our Club, has to go through an incorporation process; we have to vote on this next week.

### There will be a social gathering this Friday at Agaba from 5.15pm.

Brian Donnelly asked for more helpers for the Annual Food Bank Appeal next Saturday November 26<sup>th</sup>. Meet at the Chalet just before 4pm, and the job should finish at 6 pm.

### Main Programme:

Mike Charles provided background for the Iran Ambassador to NZ, Kambiz Sheikh-Hassani. Aged 44, he and his family have had three Australasian postings, Wellington 1988-92 as First Secretary, Canberra 92- 2000 as Deputy Head, and now as Ambassador from 2003. His Excellency spoke of two major areas of interest, then answered a variety of questions with admirable fact and opinion responses. First he made a strong case for Iran's right to keep nuclear capacity to provide an essential alternative energy source. In the 60's and 70's Iran was encouraged by the U.S. to diversify energy sources. But from

1979 post-Revolution, the same supporter did not want the country to have nuclear power. (He was factual and tactful about sensitive political matters!). Despite population growth from 32 million to 70 million in these times daily oil production had dropped from 6 million barrels to 4 million barrels and only 1 million barrels was available for export. 70% of Iran's people are under 30 years, so finding employment for this population base is another major problem. Pollution has come with increased living standards post-Revolution (now all homes have electricity) and last year in Teheran 17,000 people died of respiratory disease. Iran needs more energy, and the small proportion of resource from CNG, geothermal power and wind power will not provide sufficient to meet ever-growing need. Yet in 1995 the US asked Iran to forgo its right to any form of nuclear power. Secondly His Excellency outlined the strong trade alliance formed with New Zealand 31 years ago. Now there is \$150 million in trade between to two countries. While trade products have diversified somewhat from the original NZ export of lamb, dairy products and wool (we no longer send lamb), he spoke of education growth here with 10 Iranian students now, and 30 students hoped for soon. Massey University is one of 5 NZ universities to sign heads of agreement for tertiary study. Technical and economic matters now too form part of the alliance between the two countries. It was a fascinating talk giving fresh insights into Iran and its people.

Charlie has recently been elected National President of Federated Farmers which he stated was the largest lobby group in the country with over 18,000 members employing 65 staff in 13 offices throughout the country. Charlie in partnership with his wife conducts a substantial farming operation at Himatangi with 1400 dairy cows & a large sheep & cattle fattening business. He personally acknowledged several club members he had been associated with over the past years. Bob Filbee (Police Force) was also acknowledged in his support for drug and alcohol education in schools with the programme.

### Main Programme:

Main Speaker Dr Ian Anderson from Massey University talked about the evolving role of DNA technology in equine genetics. A veterinarian initially, Ian was appointed Director of the EPAGSC (the centre for equine genetic research) in 1986 when it was established jointly by Massey University and the racing industry. Four main sections of his talk dealt with the history of the Centre, parentage verification of foals, DNA typing of horses, and "the luck of genetics". The centre worked from 1990 until 2001 getting a reliable data base on foal crops over those years using bloodline typing. This more sure record of lineage was recorded in the New Zealand Stud Book, and 110,000 foals were tested in this period. From 2002 onwards 20,000 foals have been typed using the new and advanced DNA more typing available, and lan gave a fascinating glimpse of some scenarios where accuracy of establishing correct parental lineage was possible and foolproof using this method. Some mares take over another mare's foal soon after birth (for instance if two mares foaled in the same paddock). Occasionally there is confusion as to which stallion has covered a mare and sired the foal. Rarely, samples get confused. In each case DNA genetic identification sorts the problem and gives security to the proper parentage.

The luck of genetics referred to the as-yet inability to manipulate and produce a winner on the basis of genetic modification.

In thanking lan for a fascinating and accessible talk Kevin O'Donnell commended the availability of Massey expertise to inform Rotarians and others of their expertise.

There were 220 bands there and our band was placed 10<sup>th</sup> in the world, a higher placing than gained in 2002 when they were placed 13<sup>th</sup>. A full-time Scottish band was 1<sup>st</sup>, an Irish band 2<sup>nd</sup> and each of these had previously won many world titles. Our NZ Champion Band did very well, though still a "novice" band at the World Championship level. Also there were 5 NZ Highland dancers (with 200 others), drum majors competing, and various challenging Highland competitions.

Main Programme: Guest speaker Craig Mitchell is Group Manager of Environmental Management for Horizons Manawatu. Vern Chettleburgh introduced Craig, thanking him for speaking at very short notice. Craig gave a full overview of the new approach a new Council and senior managers were taking with renewed Vision and Purpose honing in closer to identified needs of this huge region. Regional Councils are governed by 8 Statutes. This area, 22,000 square kilometres in nine regions, has a mere 220,000 population, most of which is urban based. It is a \$40m business, with \$7 for natural resource management, \$2.5m for transport, \$2m for governance, \$1.2m for community engagement, \$0.7m regional development and \$27m for risk management. Most of that latter sum goes on possum control, and it is hoped to be possum-free, therefore bovine TB free, by 2008 to 2013. This has been a major focus because of the positive chain effects from proper control in this wide area. With 61% of the land in the region rather fragile hill country, much effort has gone into ground control too.

Major issues identified and confirmed as issues by community surveys are hill country erosion, water quantity, water quality, nature biodiversity loss and natural hazard threats. Forward planning goals aim to provide more meaningful and practical information to all people in the region.

Gerry then went on to describe how things have changed for both himself & the Mayor - how he is able to assist her not only in the performance of her duties but recognising his part in this important position in the City. No doubt continuing the partnership that they have enjoyed for many vears to date & more to come no doubt.

Main Speaker Mel Hagan was introduced by Ross Hayton. Mel is local educator for the Life Education Trust, a private trust which has chosen to be financially self- reliant. There are 18 programmes throughout New Zealand, usually operating from one of 46 mobile classrooms which are technologically up to the minute. Interactive programmes engage preschool to Year 8 children in learning about Nutrition, Self-Esteem, Anatomy and Drugs. Mel presented the Nutrition overview where the focus is ageappropriate to encourage young children to have a balanced diet, be active and understand the nature of food from the energy input and energy outcome viewpoint. She talked about modern society's change of patterns in style of food intake, amount of exercise taken, and perception of what diet and exercise is all about. We need to encourage the key-words in a new anti-obesity programme - be Active, be knowledgeable about Appetite and develop the right Attitude to nutrition and how it can help the next generation.

The Manawatu Branch of Life Education Trust (formed in the 1980's by Trevor Grice) visited schools from Rangiwahia, to Bainesse, and nearly all primary schools had an annual visit from Harold the Giraffe and Mel and the Mobile Classroom.

Speaker John Belgrave, the Chief Ombudsman was introduced by Kevin O'Sullivan who remarked on the association our city has with the office starting with Sir Guy Powles (the 1<sup>st</sup> office holder) to Sir Brian Elwood (former Mayor & fellow club member) & Judge Satyanandall former Ombudsmen. John backgrounded the office of Ombudsman which stems from a 16<sup>th</sup> century Scandinavian heritage. In a nut shell he (or she) is an official appointed by Parliament to investigate complaints by individuals against the Government or Public Service. As a former top Public Servant he has now been on both sides of the fence! He explained the relevance of his duties to NZ & how his office fulfilled its role. He noted that Asian. Maori & Pacific Island members of the community have a reluctance to use the services of his office & part of his role is to encourage them to do so. The office deals with 6-6500 complaints per annum & has 500 in action at any particular time- seems a daunting workload! In about 25% of cases the office finds that a refusal to release information is justified, With Mr Belgrave's clear account we can indeed conclude we are fortunate to have such an institution.

Welcome back – Ian Reid – Great to see Ian back after his recent trials and tribulations. **3Min Talk: Selwyn Sawyer** continued his memories of the effect of the atomic bomb on Japan. He, with 4,000 others, was based in Yamaguchi. To get there on his arrival from Italy his battalion travelled through bombravaged Hiroshima city where the centre, for a mile radius, was completely obliterated. Selwyn found himself in Stores, for the J Force Canteen Service. The mood of Japan was mixed; the military had not wanted to sign a peace treaty, yet thousands more men on both sides would have been killed in continuing combat. World powers that had atomic bombs (USA, UK, France, China and Russia) signed the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty some time later. But Israel, India, Pakistan and North Korea did not. Selwyn's worries for the future relate particularly to the use of atomic weaponry by terrorists.

### **Our Main Programme:**

Speaker Chris Boyle was introduced by Peter Askey. "The Great 2005 From Peking to Paris Expedition" was a graphic account of the replication of the original 1907 expedition where four cars and a Contal Cycle (a three-wheel vehicle on which Chris and his travel partner painfully travelled) took 59 days to traverse. They journeyed from Beijing through Mongolia then a long trek across Russia to the East European countries which tracked down to Belgium then finally to France. The vast Gobi desert impressed as did the hospitality and mechanical ingenuity of the village people in each country. Long delays and the need to "accommodate" to border requests, the persistent requests for rides on the bike, photographs with the travellers and the constant engulfment of dirt and sand were trials to be met. Overall this was the trip of a lifetime for Chris, adding to his incredible range of mountain climbs and difficult traverses. 15,000 kms through 10 countries in 1907 vehicles required stamina, and we look forward to the ABC documentary which was being shot on the way. Chris's final picture showed a monument with a Franklin D Roosevelt saying "Men are not prisoners of fate, but only prisoners of their own mind".
